Students will write a 5-7 page final paper in which they provide a historical analysis a novel from the course. In this essay the Students will

- 2. Provide their own perspective on the novel's place within this history of the novel;
- 3. Draw on at least three concepts from the course when composing the essay.

A successful paper will demonstrate that the student read the selected novel, read relevant and reliable sources on the selected novel, adhere to the conventions of a college essay.
