Course Overview

This course introduces students to the novel as a literary form and explores its development in historical context. Students will read selected novels, and selected essays on the history of the novel and its influence on global cultures.

Course Goals

- 1. Students will learn about the historical and formal development of the novel;
- 2. Students will read selected novels from key eras in its development;
- 3. Students will practice strategies for reading and interpreting novels;
- 4. Students will write about the novels they read.

Mid-term

An essay question will be included in mid-term. Students are required to submit a roughly 500 words answer.

Final Paper

Students will write a 5-7 page final paper (2000 words) in which they provide a historical analysis a novel from the course. In this essay the Students will

1. Locate, read and incorporate secondary sources on the place of their selected novel within the



history of the novel;

- 2. Provide their own perspective on the novel's place within this history of the novel;
- 3. Draw on at least three concepts from the course when composing the essay.

A successful paper will demonstrate that the student read the selected novel, read relevant and reliable sources on the selected novel, adhere to the conventions of a college essay. Note: All aspects of the course must be completed to pass the class.

Due to the on-going pandemic, there is a possibility that in-person courses move to online delivery. Students will be notified once the decision is made.

If the in-person courses are to be changed to online courses, we will make a few adjustments:

Lecture: All lectures will be recorded on Zoom and uploaded to the SJTU SCE online learning platform on a daily basis. Students are required to watch the lecture according to course schedule. Every lecture will be followed by a short reflection. The reflections will be short, (75 to 100 words). Students will submit the prompt to the bCourses discussion board for that day, where they will receive a response from the instructor. Reflections will count toward participation

Discussion: There will be 4 hours of open interaction on Zoom every week during which students may ask questions of the instructor, receive help with work, and interact with classmates in small groups. Students should view these sessions as an opportunity to discuss their work with one another, and to develop greater comprehension of the readings.

Office Hours: Office hours will be held on Fridays, via Zoom, for 2 hours each week. The instructor will be available via Blackboard discussions and email Monday through Friday.

Exams: There is one midterm for the course. It will include two, short essay questions. Students will receive the midterm 48 hours in advance of the due date and submit the completed version to Blackboard. There is also a final essay in the course, which students will submit to Blackboard.
